Get a Fee Waiver

- Talk to your school counselor or your local community-based organization to get a fee waiver.
- Know the eligibility requirements (sat.org/fee-waivers).

□ Register for the SAT[®] and SAT Subject Tests[™] Using Your Fee Waiver

- You can register either online or by mail. If you need access to a computer or the internet, see your school counselor or visit a local Boys & Girls Club for a safe place to study with support from trained staff. Visit **bgca.org** to find a local club.
- Indicate that you're paying with a fee waiver, and enter the entire 12-digit code. If you are registering by paper, enclose the completed card in the envelope.
- Use your four additional score reports to send your scores to colleges for free, at any time in high school.
- Order either the Question-and-Answer Service or the Student Answer Service for the SAT.
- During registration, sign up for **Student Search Service**[®], a program that connects you with college and scholarship opportunities, at **sat.org/studentsearch**.
- Start thinking about four-year colleges.

□ Get Ready for the Test

- Create your own personalized SAT study plan.
- Prepare for the SAT with free, personalized, and official SAT practice at **satpractice.org** and test directions, sample questions, and a full-length practice test in *The SAT Student Guide*.
- Check out the Daily Practice for the New SAT app, to answer one SAT question a day.
- Did you take the PSAT/NMSQT[®]? Sign in to studentscores.collegeboard.org. You can link your results to get personalized practice recommendations and use SAT Skills Insight[™] to help boost your skills in challenging areas.

□ Prepare for College

- Create your own pledge to attend college.
- Make a college plan, find the right college, and learn how to apply and pay for it at **BigFuture**[™].
- Register with CSS/Financial Aid PROFILE® to apply for financial aid.
- Don't let worries about tuition cost or grades hold you back.
- Apply to college with your four college application fee-waiver forms that will be delivered directly to you. If you don't receive them, ask your counselor to provide them to you.
